ADVENT IS....

Perhaps your children or grandchildren have asked you why they have Advent calendars? Perhaps you might use this holiday item to instruct them on the real significance of Advent.

Advent comprises the four Sundays before Christmas Day, and it is a time or preparation in repentant hope and anticipation of the coming of Jesus Christ (both as a baby in Bethlehem and of His second coming to judge the living and the dead). Advent literally means "coming", and in Advent we celebrate the fact that Jesus came as a baby some 2000 years ago; we celebrate that He still comes to us today in His Word and Sacraments; and we celebrate the fact that He will come again in the future on Judgment Day.



The advent Wreath is a regular feature of this season. It is filled with symbolism. The four candles count down the weeks to Christmas. It is formed in a circle representing the fact that God has no beginning or end. Evergreen foliage is used to illustrate that Jesus brings life to us. The wreath is suspended between the floor and the ceiling showing that Christ has entered into our time and space to be our Saviour.

This year we will be celebrating Advent with mid-week Wednesday evening worship services. On Wednesday 5 & 19 December we will gather at 5.45 pm. for worship, and on Wednesday 12 December we will be hosting the Orpington Chorale Christmas Concert at 8.00 pm.

LAST WORD

One of the most enduring pictures many of us have about Christmas is the shepherds sitting on the hillside, tending their flocks, when the angels fill the sky and proclaim that the Saviour of the world is born in Bethlehem. We can imagine their terror at the glorious sight. But we can also imagine their joy when the words of the angelic visitors finally sunk in. It is a wonderful picture. But why did God choose to reveal the birth of Jesus to lowly shepherds? The shepherd was not held in very high esteem. Generally they were young, uneducated, and considered to be very unclean due to their work. What a very unlikely gang to reveal the birth of the Messiah to. But the One revealed to them was the Good Shepherd of John 10. He is the One who knows His sheep and calls them by name as He leads them throughout their lives. He searches for us when we are lost and picks us up and puts us on His shoulders and brings us home. While the shepherds on the hills around Bethlehem did not know it, the child they were going to adore was the Good Shepherd. But the baby was more than just a Good Shepherd; He was also the Lamb of God. John the Baptist declared Jesus to be "The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). It was no coincidence that many of the shepherds who tended their flocks around Bethlehem were watching over the sheep that would eventually end up as sacrifices in the Temple in Jerusalem. These sheep were offered up because of the sins of the people;

the sheep gave their lives as a sacrifice and substitute for the people who deserved death because of their rebellion.

And this little baby lying in the straw of the manger was also the Lamb of God. A perfect, spotless, sinless lamb who would offer himself as a sacrifice for all of us because of our evil. In fact, Isaiah 53 gives us a marvellous picture of Jesus being led like the lamb to the slaughter for the transgressions of His people. This Lamb of God was sacrificed in our place, and His blood now covers our sins. Thus when God looks at us now, He no longer sees our sins, but the righteousness of Jesus. Through faith in the Christmas child, God declares us innocent

The picture of the shepherds on the hillsides is indeed a wonderful one. But it is even more extraordinary then we think because the baby they went to see was their Good Shepherd and their Lamb of God who took their sins (and ours) away.
